Yolo Basin Foundation will hold its annual benefit *Bucks for Ducks* on October 17th at the UC Davis ARC Pavilion from 5:30 to 9 pm. The evening includes both live and silent auctions, exciting raffle prizes, a Buckhorn catered meal, local wines, and the popular auctioneer, Joe Gates!

What's New at Bucks for Ducks?

Many new items are in store for this year's event in addition to Sudwerk's new Wildlife Area wild rice beer! The raffle will feature an assortment of great prizes including a \$500 REI gift card grand prize. Several of the new live auction items include a two night stay at a boutique hotel in Healdsburg, a whitewater rafting trip on the South Fork of the American River, and a Joseph Bellacera painting of the Wildlife Area. Tickets for the *Gaggle of Gatherings*, a series of field trips and adventures will be released at *Bucks for Ducks*. An exciting new field trip to the Sutter Buttes will be available. This trip is guided by Gene Trapp and will include some time with Dave Wyatt who is researching and live-trapping ringtails. Thanks to Sudwerk Brewing Co., Yolo Basin Foundation will be pouring local wild rice beer at *Bucks for Ducks* on October 17th. Sudwerk brewers are currently developing a wild rice lager packed with a variety of local ingredients, including California grown hops. "We had been looking to make a beer with a local ingredient that incorporates and reflects our unique agricultural position here in the greater Sacramento Valley," explains Sudwerk Head Brewer, Mike Hutson. "Rice, more specifically wild rice, seemed to be the logical choice. Brewing a beer with tomatoes just seemed wrong!"

This will be a wonderful backdrop for the students who begin their Discover the Flyway field trips on the benches in front of the trailer. Congratulations to Joy, Barb and their crew of dedicated volunteers! 🍷

Trenton Yackzan, Operations Manager of Sudwerk Brewing sees this beer as a “great local partnership. We love sourcing local, working with local partners, and supporting our community.” The Sudwerk staff and brewers have generously donated their time and their beer to make this creative lager a success. Sudwerk Brewing Co. is dedicated to “redefining the American lager” and a Yolo Bypass Wildlife Area wild rice beer allows them to do just that.

The wild rice for this beer comes from DeWit Family Farms and is grown in the Wildlife Area. Jack DeWit has been growing rice since the 1970's in what is now the Yolo Bypass Wildlife Area and is a Yolo Basin Foundation board member.

Sudwerk will be brewing two different beers this fall, using Jack's

rice. The first beer, which is already in the tank, includes wild rice and rye. Mike describes this beer as “copper in color and will showcase the nutty and toasty qualities of the wild rice as well as the spicy character contributed by the rye malt.” He continues, “It should be a fairly complex beer. The next beer we brew with it will be an amber/red beer that will contain a portion of crystal malts. These malts will contribute a malty sweetness that should play well with the nutty flavors the wild rice imparts. Both should be solid, flavorful beers.”

Yolo Basin Foundation is very excited to serve a beer so close to our home and hearts! If you are interested in submitting a name for our beer, post your suggestions on Yolo Basin Foundation's Facebook page. 🍷
